



Let's commend the unsung heroes in the fight against Covid-19, the doctors. Now seventeen years later, his passion for serving the people still exists; evident in his display of sincere emotion, crying twice during the outbreak. One set of tears for the people of China as the virus was spreading very fast and seemed out of control.

The second set of tears was for Li Man Leung. Nanshan felt aggrieved for Li Man Leung as he showed his concern for his colleague. A man that cries for his people and country is absolutely respectable. It's incredibly touching to witness one doctor pay tribute to one of his peers as Zhong Nanshan did with Li Man Leung.

The one thing the two doctors had in common is faith in victory.

In conclusion, the doctors fighting Covid-19 like soldiers knowing they can kiss death at any moment are angels on Earth. They could have chosen to hide and feel the warmth of their families. But they decided to take the hard road in life for the greater good. There are so many doctors I don't know and I don't mention in my article. But I will give them my best wishes and respect. I hope they can return to their families soon. They truly are 'heroes in harm's way'.

Flying High with Miss Zhu

As an idealistic 12 year old new to Hong Kong, I joined the primary school organization 'I Want to Fly High'; which I was a member of for a year. This scholastic association provided numerous activities for students newly arrived to Hong Kong. It gave immigrants like me an opportunity to adapt to the pace and culture of Hong Kong by providing games and teamwork activities. But it also gave me a chance to make a difference by doing community service.



'I Want to Fly High' is where I met a good person that does good deeds, a local social worker named Miss Zhu. Miss Zhu had been in charge of 'I Want to Fly High' in our school for many years. The wonderful Miss Zhu is very approachable and helpful and makes everything enjoyable. Compared to when I first arrived in Hong Kong, I am no longer a stranger. I am used to living here because Miss Zhu helped melt away my insecurities. She organized many interesting activities in the program, such as barbecues, volunteer activities, Ocean Park day trips and camping. Those activities helped me a lot. They not only made me happy, but also made me closer to Hong Kong.

She never hesitates to help others and is never condescending. For instance, there was a rock climbing activity, I was terribly frightened to participate. When other students had no issues with climbing high, I stood aside shivering and dreading the moment it was my turn. Miss Zhu comforted me. She encouraged me with her words and promised me that she would keep me safe. I had to overcome this difficult situation so I tried. But I still felt scared and I cried. Although I did not do well, Miss Zhu and other students gave me a surprising applause. This could have been a moment where I would have been overwhelmed with a sense of failure or worse been the target of bullying. But Miss Zhu eased the situation and made it a memorable experience that pushed me to try again.

Miss Zhu said a social worker's job is to deal with all sorts of social issues. For example, she provides support services for newly arrived immigrants like me and organizes community activities such as visiting nursing homes; which Miss Zhu provided me with the opportunity to visit a nursing home. We spent the afternoon there and I could feel the elderly people were happy because we stayed with them. They lived without their families in the nursing home for a long time, and their children did not visit them frequently. They felt lonely.

Before we visited, we had prepared numerous gifts for the old people in the home. Miss Zhu purchased the gifts then my classmates and I packaged them. Miss Zhu told us beforehand that we had to be very careful to not make any promises to the residents of the nursing home; because if someone can't accept a person close to him/her, then we shouldn't fib. It would break someone's heart if we were dishonest about visiting them or having a friendship. Miss Zhu said she would prepare another visitor for a resident if we did not feel comfortable having a long term friendship with someone.

Besides giving the nursing home residents gifts, we sang old songs with them. One song that sticks out in my mind is 'The Moon Represents My Heart' (originally sung by Teresa Teng). After we sang, we played a game. A student paired up with a resident to make a team of two. Then we played catch by passing the ball to one another while 'The Moon Represents My Heart' was playing on the CD player. But when the song stopped playing, whichever team had the ball in their hand must answer a question. If they answered the question correctly, they got a present.

It's these types of brilliant activities created by Miss Zhu that make people's lives happier and more meaningful. Miss Zhu taught me to fly high and show compassion and love for the people in this wonderful city called Hong Kong.

Thanks for spending your time to listen to my aspirations for the future. I hope to hear from you soon!



Yes, I want to join again because it was really fun to practice with my friends and to work with Mr. Matthew Kavanagh.




Library Book Recommendations

Write a brief comment on your impression of the book:



If I could rewrite a part of the story, I would make the following changes:


